your identification to the library to pick up your card.

Studies show that children who use the library perform better in school. That personal connection to the library begins with a child's first library card.

As part of the What Are You Reading? community literacy initiative, the Canton Public Library and the Plymouth Canton Community Schools (PCCS) are teaming up to make sure every student in Canton has a library card. To make the process really easy, a special library card application form was sent to the home of every PCCS student. If you still need a form, download one from the Library's website at www.cantonpl.org/info/wayr.html. After the form is completed and signed by a parent, the student brings it back to school. Elementary age children return the forms to their teachers, and middle and high school students turn them in at class schedule pick-up days. Students who return forms will receive an official Canton Public Library card with all the privileges and responsibilities of card ownership. Make sure your student starts the year off right with an orange Canton Public Library card.







Your Michigan Family History

October is Family History Month, and whether you are new to Michigan or your family has lived here for generations, the Canton Public Library has great resources to learn more about our community's rich past. Come and browse the Library's extensive Michigan History Collection for fascinating information about our founding families and how they shaped our communities. Here are some examples of what you can find:



- *Cornerstones: A History of Canton Township Families:* detailed information about Canton from the time it was a farming community in the early 20th century until the mid 1980's.
- *Canton Memories: A Collection of Oral Histories:* a collection of videos, each highlighting interviews with significant people in Canton's history.
- *Landsmen of Wayne County: An Atlas and Plat of the First Land Owners of Wayne County, Michigan:* for genealogists interested in the history of Wayne County, including what is now Canton Township.
- In the Michigan History Collection you can also find books about the history of surrounding communities like Northville, Van Buren Township, and Plymouth.

Exploring the history of your family? Consider attending the upcoming Internet class *Genealogy Online*, on **October 27** from 7-8:30 p.m. This class will show you how to use the *AncestryPlus* database and the Internet to research your ancestors. 

TutorMe!

Online homework help from real, live tutors.

September is back-to-school time for teens in Canton. To help teens excel academically, the Canton Public Library offers TutorMe, our online tutoring service. Now in its third year, TutorMe provides assistance in math, English, science, and social studies, from 3 p.m. to midnight, seven days a week!

Here's how it works: Teens log onto the library Internet Branch, www.cantonpl.org, and click TutorMe. If you are using the service from home, you will be asked for your library card barcode number. Then you will be asked about the kind of help you need and how many times you have used the service. After answering this preliminary questionnaire, you may enter the virtual classroom where live tutors, who are experts in their fields, respond to your homework questions. If you find a tutor who has been particularly helpful you now have the option to request that person during future visits. Feel free to contact Teen Librarian, Kevin Scanlon, if you have any questions.

Homework Tips for Parents

Your friendly Canton Public Library homework/project experts (librarians) compiled their time-tested suggestions to help make homework and class project assignments enjoyable for you and your child.

Know what the assignment is.

Make certain that both you and your child know exactly what the teacher expects. If you don't, ask questions until you do understand. Bring written assignments with you to the library and show them to a librarian.

Start early!

More resources will be readily available if you come to the library soon after the assignment has been given. If your child has a choice of topics, you will be able to select the one with the most information. By beginning research well before it is due you have plenty of time to explore different resources and avoid the stress of an urgent deadline.

Become familiar with the library.

Homework assignments go smoothly if you have already been to the library and know where resources are located. Online catalogs and databases, Internet search engines, and other information sources get easier with each use. Make visits to the library part of your family routine.

Allow your child to do his/her own work.

Never select materials or research a topic for your child. Assignments are given to help students learn research strategies. Librarians love to help children develop good research skills and discover which resources would be most useful.

Be realistic about what the library can provide.

Some assignments require students to supplement written information with visual aids. Please bring your own pens, pencils, markers, paper, poster board, tape, etc. to the library.

Ask librarians for help.

An entire book may not exist on a given topic. However, a more general work may contain a chapter or a few pages that are relevant. Librarians can suggest search strategies and help find information from the large array of electronic resources now available.


